Mother Nature's Four-Season Playground

BOOK IT NOW

When you look at the numbers, it's pretty obvious why Vail Mountain is one of the most popular ski resorts in the country. This virtual winter wonderland has seven miles of mountain front, seven powdery back bowls and three terrain parks on more than 5,289 acres. Add to that 300 days of sunshine and an annual snowfall of 350 inches and you've got skiing nirvana!

But if schussing down the slopes isn't your thing, there are plenty of other winter activities to keep you busy: Take a snowshoe hike with a Nature Discovery Center ranger, ice skate at Vail Square or enjoy a sleigh ride. Spend an afternoon at Adventure Ridge, a fun-filled snow park that offers tubing, ski bikes, bungee trampolining and - for pint-sized thrills - Blizzard Speedway, where kids 6-12 can race miniature snowmobiles.

Feeling venturesome? The Nordic Sports Center runs a two-day hut trip which includes guides, equipment, hut fees and meals. Ski season runs through April, vail.com. snow.com.

BOOK IT LATER

Melting snow gives way to a myriad of new outdoor activities to enjoy in spring and summer. The Rocky Mountain air is fresh, and sunny days are ideal for everything from fishing and whitewater rafting to hiking, golf, horseback riding and biking. Bikes are easily rented in town and can be brought up Vail Mountain in a gondola. Whether you want to careen down a single track at

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a breakneck pace (specialized equipment and pads please!) or traverse the mountain at leisure, there are dozens of trails to choose from.

In addition, local bike shops will drive you to the top of Vail Pass, where you can access a paved 15-mile downhill path that winds its way along Gore Creek and back into town. Horticulture enthusiasts should stop by the Betty Ford Alpine Gardens for a stroll through a colorful collection of wildflowers and high elevation plants. The Vail Nature Center runs morn-

ing bird walks, an evening beaver pond tour and family campfires. gorerange.org

Cultural activities abound as well. The Gerald R. Ford Amphitheater, a spectacular outdoor venue on a grassy terraced hill-side, hosts both the Bravo! Vail Valley Music Festival (June 25 to August 3) and the Vail International Dance Festival (July 26 to August 10). The season kicks off with multi-Grammy winning cellist, Yo-Yo Ma, and pianist Kathryn Stott. vailmusicfestival.org, vaildance.org, 888.920. ARTS (2787)

GASTRONOMY

With so much energy expended during the day, you're bound to work up an appetite for some seriously good food and Vail does not disappoint. From creative pizza to world class gourmet cuisine, food festivals and workshops, there's something to please even the most finicky foodie.

The 20th Annual Taste of Vail, a four day celebration of fine food and wine (April 7-10), features

winemakers' dinners, seminars, the Colorado Lamb Cook-Off and a ski-in mountaintop picnic with proceeds going to charities. tasteofvail.com

If you're in town on a Sunday, the Vail farmers' market, the largest farmers' market in Colorado, is a lovely way to start your day. The market runs from the end of June to September and coincides with a special educational package offered by The Lodge at Vail. The hotel's Colorado Cookin' package includes a

tour of the market with executive chef, Rahm Fama, brunch at The Wildflower, a cooking class and, finally, dinner created with ingredients purchased at the market. lodgeatvail.com

RESTAURANTS

Game Creek Club

Half the fun is getting there. After riding the Eagle Bahn gondola you'll be escorted across Game Creek Bowl by snowcat in the winter and shuttle in the summer. The charming Bavar-

ian style lodge boasts incredible views and an eclectic menu with offerings like Rocky Mountain Elk with achote, wild mushrooms, red cabbage and whisky sauce or Moullard Duck Foie Gras with ginger pear nectar, shallot jam and balsamic figs. Lunch is strictly for members, who often ski in, but the public is welcome for dinner and Sunday brunch. Reservations essential. gamecreekclub. com, 970.754.4275



Your mouth waters as you read the menu – it's so hard to choose! Colorado lamb shank with Moroccan spiced raisins and eggplant? Brioche crusted bone marrow with wild mushrooms? 
The Wildflower



Blue Moose
